Yes / No Questions



Affirmative: Did she come home early ? Yes, she did. No, she didn't. Did your parents <u>arrive</u> last week? Yes, they did. No, they didn't. Did you study your lessons? Yes, I did. No, I didn't. **Negative:** Didn't she come early? Didn't your parents <u>arrive</u> last week? Didn't you study your lessons?

Information Questions

- Who did you call? I called my friend.
- What did you do last weekend? I <u>cleaned the house</u>.
- Where did you go yesterday? I went to Dammam.
- When did you go to Dammam? I went to Dammam yesterday.
- How did you know my name. My friend <u>told me your</u> <u>name.</u>
- Why didn't you see me last night? I didn't see you last night <u>because I had a toothache</u>.

Used to – is used to show habitual actions in the past that are no longer happening in the present. Affirmative

- I used to buy books. (but not anymore)
- We used to see each other on weekends.
- My mother used to tell stories.

Negative:

We didn't use to see each other on weekends. I didn't use to talk much. My mother didn't use to tell stories.
